## **Steps for Writing Problem-Solving**

1) Read the underlined portion(s). Annotate!

- Take an <u>inventory</u> what types of words/punctuation do you see?
- Look for <u>patterns</u> verbs, pronouns, modifiers, parallelism, run-on sentences, tricky words?
- Try the pattern match verbs to subjects, pronouns to antecedents, modifiers to nouns, etc.
- <u>Decide</u> within 20 seconds whether to continue or to skip.
- 2) Here are some indicators to look for:
  - <u>Commas</u> if you see several commas, think "list" (parallelism)
  - <u>Comma</u> if you a single comma in the underlined portion, look for a misplaced modifier phrase or a run-on sentence (no verb)
  - <u>Pronouns</u> if you see a pronoun in the underlined portion, check its antecedent plural/singular mismatch? Wrong verb tense?
  - <u>Verb</u> if you see a verb in the underlined portion, match it with its subject. Plural/singular mismatch? Wrong verb tense?

3) Answer it if you can.

4) Otherwise, try to <u>eliminate one or more choices</u>, then <u>guess</u>.

## General

- Don't get "stuck" spending minutes on tough problems that you never complete.
- Read from "inside out": start with the underlined portion, then look at the surrounding sentence, then the sentences before and after, then the paragraph, etc.
